Instructor Biographies

Brandon Wooley

Captain Brandon Wooley was hired in September 2007 as a patrol officer. He transferred to the Detectives Division in 2014 and was assigned as a Detective to the City County Special Investigations Unit (CCSIU)/Eastern Montana High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) and FBI's Transnational Organized Crime Task Force. In 2016, he was promoted to Sergeant and appointed as the CCSIU/Eastern Montana HIDTA Drug Task Force Commander. In 2017, he was recognized as Supervisor of the Year. He has served as the Administrative Lieutenant for the BPD and a Team Leader on the SWAT Team. He is currently the Captain of Operations.

Joshua Bitsko

Joshua Bitsko has been a law enforcement professional for 23 years and has held a variety of positions to include K9 Handler, K9 Training Sergeant, Detective Sergeant, Internal Affairs Lieutenant, Policy and Procedure Lieutenant, Commander of the Las Vegas Resort Corridor, and Commander over the Health, Wellness, and Safety Bureau. He has a BA in Public Administration and is an experienced instructor with over 18 years of teaching both law enforcement employees and community members. Josh responded to the largest mass shooting incident in US history, the 1 October Massacre, as a tactical element. Josh was one of three people to breach the suspect's door and led a team of officers to make entry and clear the suspect's room. Josh was also the incident commander over a mass stabbing incident on the Las Vegas Strip. This gives him unique insight on both the stressors of being on the front lines during an active shooter, and the pressures of leading a police response when lives are at stake. He has spoken around the country about the 1 October massacre, to include to the Secret Service at the White House. After action de-briefs and trainings often fail to include the emotional aftermath of our first responder community in the years following critical incidents. Josh provides personal insight into the struggles of post-traumatic stress, and strategies to assist in processing trauma. Through his first-hand experiences, Josh can not only provide quidance and training for law enforcement professionals facing the most extreme critical incidents, but also describe the mindset necessary for proper critical incident preparedness, response, and processing the aftermath.
